Marking notes: PARAGRAPH ANALYSIS EXERCISE 1

Paragraphs to be analyzed: 1, 3, 4, 5, 6 in Figure 3.4, pages 56 and 57

Paragraph: 1

Function performed: *introductory* **Topic sentence**: 2nd

Description of developmental pattern: *extended definition (descriptive)*

Sentence 1 "connects" with the reader and signals the purpose of the <u>memo</u>. Sentence 2 states the purpose of this paragraph (names the problem or challenge). Then, the paragraph extends that problem definition in sentences 3 and 4: "more complex than normal", "fluctuating interest rates" <u>and</u> "varying amortization periods", and "compounded" by not knowing length of mine operation.

Paragraph: 3

Function performed: developmental Topic sentence: I^{st}

Description of developmental pattern: a chronological pattern presents a process description. Sentence 1 announces the 6-step process; sentence 2 provides background information needed to fully understand the process; then, sentence 3 leads into the 6 steps in their chronological order.

Paragraph: <u>4</u>

Function performed: *developmental* **Topic sentence**: 1^{st}

Description of developmental pattern: emphatic argument (Statement + reasons and evidence) Sentence 1 presents the paragraph's main point. Sentences 2 through 6 name the team members and list the members' main relevant qualifications. Evidence is presented to substantiate claims.

Paragraph: 5

Function performed: developmental (can also be seen as "transitional") **Topic sentence**: l^{st}

Description of developmental pattern: *emphatic argument (Statement +supporting argument) The first half of sentence 1 provides a chronological transition from paragraph 4; the second half of the sentence states the paragraph's main point about the third qualified person in MMT's research team (i.e., he's available). Then, sentence 2 explains why MMT would want Brendan Winters to be available .*

Paragraph: 6

Function performed: developmental **Topic sentence**: l^{st}

Description of developmental pattern: emphatic argument (Statement +elaboration) Repeating "EUAC" in the first half of sentence 1 provides a transition from paragraph 5; the phrase, "the main advantage" signals why this particular argument is the first of three arguments in favor of EUAC to appear. Sentence 1 declares EUAC's main advantage: EUAC generates "qualitative" as well as "quantitative" analysis. Sentence 2 explains that advantage in a slightly different way, in order to make the argument clearer and stronger.
