Student Inquiry Questions

What is our story?

How do we develop faith and trust? How do I fit into the community? Who am I?

What types of relationships do we have? What makes us male and female? How do we make good decisions? What is community? Human dignity is about having and showing respect for others because we are created in the image and likeness of God.

All human life is sacred and has dignity, regardless of poverty, age, race, gender, disability or sexual orientation.

- The Catholic Church professes that all human life is sacred
- The inherent dignity of the human person is foundational to all other Catholic social teaching
- We develop a deeper awareness of our human dignity when we come to more fully understand God, our Creator
- Students develop an understanding of the Bible as our story to more fully understand what it means to be called into relationship with God through Jesus
